## "Being Before" Installation / Creative Work

## Background

*Being Before* explores traces of pre-existing objects, experiences and ways of ordering the world. Two multimedia installations explore issues of physical presence and simulated reality, classification and perception, authenticity and mediation.

Referencing details from the computer graphical interface Ian Gwilt's *Scrolling\_heaven* extracts metaphors from digital environments, taking them back into the physical world in the form of digital prints, video and rapid prototype models. Away from the usual intimacy of the computer screen changes in scale and media question boundaries and reference points.

Aaron Fry, Sally McLaughlin and Taylor Davis Real exploits the digital medium to assemble visual reference points: smoke stacks on the outskirts of a city, a fragment of a floral arrangement, the canopy of a palm tree. As sequences of images unfold shifts between readings such as nature as technology, nature as possession, and nature as symbol are invoked.

## Contribution / Significance

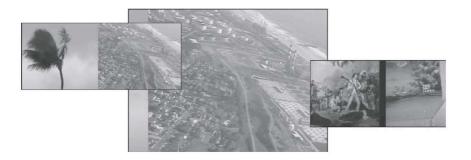

#### **Being Before**

Two multimedia installations Real by Sally McLaughlin, Aaron Fry & Taylor Davis Scrollingheaven by Ian Gwilt

Being Before explores traces in the present of pre-existing objects, experiences and ways of ordering the world. Two multimedia installations explore issues of physical presence and simulated reality, classification and perception, authenticity and mediation through the medium of sculpture, print, video and digital projections.

Referencing details from the computer graphical interface lan Gwilt's Scrolling Heaven extracts real world metaphors from digital environments taking them back into the physical world in the form of digital prints, video simulation and a rapid prototype model. Away from the usual intimacy of the computer screen and viewed out of context, the dramatic change in scale and location (onscreen computer to gallery wall) blurs boundaries and reference points, moving towards a seamless self-referential loop.

Real is a collaboration between artists Sally McLaughlin, Aaron Fry and Taylor Davis. Real exploits the generative potential of the digital medium to assemble and reassemble visual reference points smoke stacks on the outskirts of a city, a fragment of a floral arrangement depicted on a postcard, the canopy of a palm tree. Freed from their original context the images are classified according to categories that arise from our embodied understanding of the world. As sequences of images unfold shifts between readings such as nature as technology, nature as possession, and nature as symbol are invoked. Davis' viewing platforms' engage the space occupied by the viewer. The forms are completed through the presence of a viewing participant.
