ALIA has identified a role for libraries related to all of the SDGs. In particular:


- 1. Supporting freedom of access to information

- 3. Helping to communicate the 2030 Agenda to the general population










### CLARITY

When a statement is vague or fuzzy we can't tell if it's accurate or relevant.

We should ask for clarification: Can you elaborate? Can you give me an example?



### DEPTH

Statements lack depth when they fail to deal with the complexities of the issue.

Ask: Does that address the complexity of this issue/ problem?



## ACCURACY

A statement can be clear but inaccurate.

Check for accuracy: Is that really true? How can we verify that?



## BREADTH

An argument that considers only one viewpoint but ignores other perspectives lacks breadth.

Ask: What others points of view might we be missing?



## RELEVANCE

A statement can be clear, accurate, precise but irrelevant to the issue.

Ask: How is that related to this issue?



## LOGIC

When the combination of thoughts is mutually supporting and makes sense in combination, the thinking is logical.

Ask: How is it possible to be both X and Y? Isn't there a contradiction there?

# HOW TO SPOT FAKE NEWS



#### **CONSIDER THE SOURCE**

Click away from the story to investigate the site, its mission and its contact info.



#### **CHECK THE AUTHOR**

Do a quick search on the author. Are they credible? Are they real?



#### **CHECK THE DATE**

Reposting old news stories doesn't mean they're relevant to current events.



#### **CHECK YOUR BIASES**

Consider if your own beliefs could affect your judgement.



Headlines can be outrageous in an effort to get clicks. What's the whole story?



#### **SUPPORTING SOURCES?**

Click on those links. Determine if the info given actually supports the story.



#### IS IT A JOKE?

If it is too outlandish, it might be satire. Research the site and author to be sure.



#### **ASK THE EXPERTS**

Ask a librarian, or consult a fact-checking site.









## The sharing economy experience


- Easy to use online platforms that provide guidance





- Seats2meet location




### Seats2meet

- Question making asking for help from people around you




# Bibliocommons – online catalogs inspired by the sharing revolution


## Idea Exchange

- Around the World in 30 stories stories by members







## Free and equal access to that which is otherwise hard to access

- Books were once rare outside libraries and inconvenient to lug around, so libraries were needed to house them
- eBooks are not rare but are locked behind pay walls, so a role for libraries in providing access remains
- The recent embrace of makerspaces and coworking makes sense 3D printing, tools and space are in demand but difficult for everyone to access


What is the new frontier for libraries? What things will become harder to freely access in the future?

- The transformations that lie ahead require sites of disruption or catalysis, around which sustainable cities can grow and crystallise. Libraries can and should play this role.
- Libraries are community knowledge hubs and nodes in new learning networks. In these evolving spaces, citizens can connect with each other and learn new stories and practices of sustainable living, democracy and sharing that radiate out into the world.
- It does require evolution of our notions of what a library is, but the evidence from around the world (and from the Tomorrow's Libraries report) is that libraries are confidently taking this next step.
- And we will always need guides to help us navigate the sea of knowledge, no matter what form that knowledge is stored in.
